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Minn. Stat. Sec. 518.552

Subd. 1:

Spouse seeking maintenance:

- a) lacks sufficient property, including marital property apportioned to the spouse, to provide for reasonable needs
 - Consider standard of living established during the marriage
 - Consider financial effect of period of training or education

or

- b) is unable to provide adequate self-support
 - · Consider standard of living established during the marriage
 - Consider appropriate employment
 - Consider whether recipient spouse is the custodian of a child whose condition makes it appropriate that the custodian not be required to seek employment outside the home

Subd. 2.

Factors in Determining Amount and Duration:

- a) the financial resources of the party seeking maintenance
 - include marital property apportioned to the party
 - Consider ability to meet needs independently
 - · Consider child support if custodian
- the time necessary to acquire sufficient education or training
 - Consider probability of completion given age and skills

- the standard of living established during the marriage
 - Fine dining
 - Lavish vacations
- d) the duration of the marriage
 - If homemaker, consider length of absence from employment and the extent to which education, skills, or experience have become outmoded and earning capacity diminished
- e) the loss of earnings, seniority, retirement benefits, and employment opportunities forgone

- f) age, physical and emotional condition
- the ability of the spouse from whom maintenance is sought to meet needs while meeting those of the spouse seeking maintenance
- h) the contribution of each party in the acquisition, preservation, depreciation, or appreciation in the amount or value of the marital property, as well as the contribution of a spouse as a homemaker or in furtherance of the other party's employment or business

Short-Hand Analysis

a) Financial Resources of the Party Seeking Maintenance

VS.

Ability of Obligor Spouse to Meet Needs While Meeting Those of Recipient Spouse

The maintenance issue essentially amounts to a balancing of the recipient's need against the obligor's financial condition. <u>Crosby v. Crosby</u>, 587 N.W.2d 292 (Minn. Ct. App. 1998)

Although there are seven factors the issue is basically the financial needs of the parties and their ability to meet those needs. <u>Erlandson v. Erlandson</u>, 318 N.W.2d 36 (Minn. 1982)
